Subject: DWSD response on sunk costs and non-contracted rates

Liane,

Attached is the letter from DWSD (Sue McCormick) to Treasurer Dillon regarding stranded or sunk costs and non-contracted water rates to the City of Flint and Genesee County water systems. These were requested by the Governor during the meeting I attended on April 20, though DWSD was supposed to provide actual figures by the April 24 response.

While the DEQ does not involve itself in rate negotiations between parties, continued delays in not having these costs and rates negotiated creates burdens on both sides which places the ability to complete other capital improvement and rehabilitation projects in limbo, creating the potential for compliance issues. Uncertainties regarding the future of the DWSD also add complexity to this situation.

As both the City of Flint and City of Detroit will continue to reside under auspices of emergency financial managers administered by the Treasury Department for the near future, it is hoped that resolutions to these issues can be reached in a timely manner.

We would greatly appreciate it if you and/or Director Wyant could relay these concerns as part of the DEQ's continued discussions with the Treasury Department and keep things moving forward. We of course, will continue to provide any technical assistance they might request.
