- Massachusetts (Yvette Depeiza) – especially in working with Steve

Estes-Smargiassi of the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority (serves Boston); Steve was on the NDWAC LCR workgroup and his contact information is as follows: smargias@mwra.com (617-788-4303)

- Wisconsin (Jill Jonas) – in working with Region 5 on some selected communities as part of an EJ project.
- North Carolina (Jessica Godreau) – in working with the city of Durham, that had some very high lead levels

Biggest firestorm I have experienced in almost 40 years, and to think it is about a water system that has never exceeded an Action Level.

Thank you for the offer of assistance. If you could quickly identify a few states that have actively initiated lead sampling programs at schools &/or child care facilities connected to municipal water systems so that we could learn from their experiences, it would help us right now. We are being tasked with developing a sampling protocol or regimen as well as a cost estimate to implement such a sampling program aimed more at identifying risk from lead exposure in drinking water than at determining SDWA compliance (one liter first draw sampling).
