Good morning:

The attached updated press release includes additional information and edits as requested by the governor's office. Please review as soon as possible, as we will be sending our final version back to them and DEQ at 11 a.m.

In addition to the press release updates, the governor has the following questions – please review the responses and provide edits/ feedback **before 11 AM**:

Do the elevated lead levels stick with a person for life?

We do see blood lead levels decrease after education takes place and exposure to lead sources is reduced. Lead has a half- life in blood of approximately 25 days; in soft tissue, about 40 days; and in the non-labile portion of bone, more than 25 years.

Why do the lead levels spike on a seasonal basis?

When reviewing historical trend data, the risk of lead exposure is highest during the third quarter of each year – July through September. Seasonal variation is the result of a number of factors including increased exposure to lead in dust and soil in the summer months.
