Right, got it now!

Director Wyant did more than 15 interviews one week ago today. In those, we talked about the governor's plan, including sending teams into the schools in Flint to look for sources and check water sources for lead.

Several of the reporters keyed-in on the provision in the governor's plan which calls for the state to promote lead awareness for the schools, many of which have never been tested. The public awareness campaign will be lead by DHHS. It is still under development. This did not stop a lot of reporters from wanting to talk about it.
